HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED AND THE MARGIN OF ERROR CALCULATED

The CBS News/YouGov survey of 1,298 adult Catholics living in the U.S. was conducted between April 30-May 5, 2025.

This sample was weighted according to gender, age, race, education, and Mass attendance according to the 2023-24 Pew Religious Landscape Study. Respondents were selected to be representative of adult Catholics living in the U.S. Of the 1,298 respondents, 1205 were selected from YouGov's online panel, 82 were selected from ThinkNow's online panel, 8 were selected from Offerwise's online panel, and 3 were selected from Dynata's online panel. Interviews were conducted in English and Spanish. The weights range from 0.1 to 6.5, with a mean of 1 and a standard deviation of 1.0.

The margin of error (a 95% confidence interval) for a sample percentage p based upon the entire sample is approximately ± 3.8 points. It is calculated using the formula

$$\hat{p} \pm 100 \times \sqrt{\frac{1 + \mathsf{CV}^2}{n}}$$

where CV is the coefficient of variation of the sample weights and n is the sample size used to compute the proportion. This is a measure of sampling error (the average of all estimates obtained using the same sample selection and weighting procedures repeatedly). The sample estimate should differ from its expected value by less than margin of error in 95 percent of all samples. It does not reflect non-sampling errors, including potential selection bias in panel participation or in response to a particular survey.
